A community trust: new leadership and governance approaches for multi-agency working (Primary and secondary)

This workshop will showcase the School Partnership Trust in Leeds which comprises five foundation schools and two external organisations; the Leeds Primary Care Trust and Leeds Trinity and All Saints College. The trust brings together the youth service, early years, education welfare and psychologist and school nursing services for the benefit of children, placing their families at the centre of intervention. Early successes include being commissioned to deliver Children's Centres locally and achieving nil exclusions for 20 months across the five schools.

Theme Three - Enhancing sustainability: leadership for the long term

Models of leadership making the head's life easier to support work-life balance and succession (Primary and secondary)

National Leaders of Education and National Support Schools: supporting schools causing concern (Primary and secondary)

NCSL first proposed the identification and designation of excellent school leaders and their staff as National Leaders of Education (NLEs) and National Support Schools (NSSs) as a resource to support schools in challenging circumstances two years ago. 120 NLEs/NSSs have already been identified and initial evaluations from their work have been positive, providing benefits for both the schools being supported and the NLEs/NSSs themselves. Plans are now in place to expand the scheme further in the years ahead. Headteachers Michael Wilkins and Christine Hobson will talk about their work as NLEs/NSSs and the leadership learning that has come from it.

Executive headship and federations (Primary and secondary)

The Dover Federation for the Arts is a federation of four schools in Dover. When St Radigund's primary school was threatened with closure in late 2006 because it was one of the lowest performing school in the country, Chris Russell, the Chief Executive of

local secondary school and federation, Astor College for the Arts, offered to support it through a federation. The school was renamed White Cliffs Primary College for the Arts and just one year later Ofsted returned in December 2007 to find that "the transformation in this school has been remarkable..." This workshop will outline how the federation has developed and some of the leadership learning that others could draw from this.
